Ilaria Geddes is a PhD candidate at the University of Cyprus. Her consultancy work covered spatial and statistical analysis of space use and urban development plans, including Bucklesbury House and Tate Modern 2 in London. She has published research on housing, health inequalities, the spatial distribution of social factors and the relationship between health and the built environment in independent reports as well as in academic journals. Her current research interests focus on urban theory, urban morphology and the development of multidisciplinary approaches to the study of the urban form.
